




## **How to Take a Speed Test**

The Washington State Broadband Office will accept speed tests as evidence for substantiating challenges and rebuttals. End users will be required to take three measurements or tests on different days within the challenge period of April 15 − May 14, 2024. Please access the <u>Broadband Navigator</u>, follow this guide, and register your speed test.

 To take a speed test in the Broadband Navigator<sup>™</sup>, zoom to your address by using the search bar or zoom tools.




Select 'Take a Speed Test' in the 'Connectivity Hub' pane in the bottom left corner of the application.




3. A window will appear where you can select if you are on a VPN, mobile/wireless network, or if you are using your network heavily for video streaming or gaming.








4. If you select any of the options a warning will appear telling you that speed tests work best when on a stable, wired connection, without any VPN software enabled.




- Select 'Begin' and the speed test will automatically begin. The speed test may take several minutes to complete.
- If your service level is sufficient, you will not be asked to submit the speed test for evidence.








7. If your service is insufficient, you will be prompted to begin an evidence submission. Select 'Start'.



8. A form will appear prompting the user to input contact information, provider information, and property type. Additionally, the user will be required to input their current service plan including plan download and upload speeds – information that can be found on their service bill.



- 9. The Broadband Navigator™ will automatically e-mail the user after 24 hours with a link to take another speed test until three speed tests have been taken in compliance with BEAD guidelines.
  - a. If the user's current plan speeds are below 100/20, the user will not be required to take additional speed tests.
- 10. The state will use the median result of three speed tests, taken on separate days, to identify service levels.
