SAVE WATER

As much as 50 percent of the water we use outdoors is wasted from inefficient watering methods and systems. Here are some tips to save water:

- Adjust sprinklers so they're watering your lawn and garden, and not the street or sidewalk.
 - Water early in the morning (before 10 a.m.) or later in the evening (after 6 p.m.).
 - Water established lawns about 1 inch per week; a bit more during hot, dry weather.
 - Add a shut-off nozzle to your garden hose and save about 5-7 gallons each minute your hose is on.
 - Adjust your mower to a higher setting.
 A taller lawn provides shade to the roots and helps retain soil moisture, so your lawn requires less water.
 - Inspect your overall irrigation system for leaks, broken lines, or blockage in the lines.
 A well maintained system will save you money, water and time.

• Verify that your home is leak-free, because many homes have hidden water leaks. Read your water meter before and after a two-hour period when no water is being used. If the meter does not read exactly the same, there is a leak.

Dam Safety

The summer months are near and we want you to be safe when you are out enjoying activities on the water. Water areas near a dam pose serious hidden dangers to boaters and swimmers. Water discharge and turbines can be very hazardous. Follow these safety tips to keep safe when on the water this summer:


Always wear a lifejacket when on the water.
Never play, swim or anchor a boat near a dam.
Watch for overhead cables and power lines.
Obey all warning and closure signs.
Never cross the boater safety cable near a dam.




